Long Island Bulldog Rescue Foster Care Agreement

This agreement, between the Long Island Bulldog Rescue and the Foster Care Volunteer(s), must be completed if any Bulldog is placed in the custody of the Foster Care Volunteer(s).

Breed Information:

Bulldogs are typically affectionate and friendly, and the Long Island Bulldog Rescue will not knowingly place a dog with an unsound temperament. However, no one can predict how any dog will react in a given situation without full knowledge of its life experiences before rescue. Therefore, Foster Care Volunteers are strongly urged to exercise prudence and caution in introducing a rescued Bulldog into new situations until it has become fully adjusted to its new environment and the Foster Care Volunteer has had an opportunity to become familiar with the dog's unique personality. Long Island Bulldog Rescue make's no claims, representations, or warranties regarding the temperament, behavior, or health of any rescued Bulldog.

Foster Care Requirements:

A foster home should have a fenced yard for exercise. If this is not possible, the dog must be exercised on a leash. A Long Island Bulldog Rescue member may visit the prospective foster home to evaluate it for rescue dog placement. You will also be required to complete an Adoption Application to provide information about your household and living circumstances.

A Bulldog placed in foster care is not owned by the Foster Care Volunteer(s). If, for any reason, the Foster Care Volunteer(s) cannot keep the rescued dog, he/she will return the dog to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member who placed the dog with him/her. The final decision on placing the rescued Bulldog in a new home will be made by an authorized member of the Long Island Bulldog Rescue. If the Foster Care Volunteer suggests a possible placement, or wants to adopt the dog being fostered, an adoption application must be completed, and the adoption must be approved by the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member.

The Foster Care Volunteer is expected to provide food, shelter and necessary transportation to the rescued Bulldog at no cost to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue. Expenses for routine and emergency veterinary care will be paid for by Long Island Bulldog Rescue, this must be pre authorized unless the dog in danger of losing it's life.

Important: Foster Care Volunteers are not insured against loss or damage resulting from any rescue activities. Therefore, Long Island Bulldog Rescue strongly recommends that Foster Care Volunteers consider obtaining appropriate insurance coverage for themselves. Providers of homeowners' insurance can explain the requirements and costs of such protection.

Agreement:

This contract is made between the Long Island Bulldog Rescue. as represented by the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member whose signature appears below and the Foster Care Volunteer(s) whose signature appears below.

The Foster Care Volunteer(s) agrees to:

- 1. Provide temporary shelter for the Bulldog with the understanding that the Bulldog will eventually be placed in a permanent home or returned to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue, as may be necessary.
- 2. Provide this dog with proper food, fresh water, and adequate shelter at all times.
- 3. Provide necessary veterinary treatment for this dog from a veterinarian well-qualified to treat Bulldogs, including annual examinations, DHLPP and rabies vaccinations, and heartworm and intestinal parasite checks, to be followed by periodic use of preventatives. Except in cases of emergency, veterinary treatments other than those related to the annual examination, including all surgical procedures, must be approved by the Long Island Bulldog Rescue in advance.
- 4. Comply with all state and local laws and ordinances related to keeping this dog, including leash/license laws.
- 5. Keep the Bulldog at the residence address stated below and provide the new address and/or telephone number to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue immediately in the event of a change of residence or telephone number.
- 6. Never give or sell this dog to another person, agency, or animal shelter or to allow it to be used for experimentation, dog fighting, or any other commercial or illegal activity.
- 7. Immediately notify the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member named below to make arrangements to return the animal to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member if, for any reason, you are unable to keep this dog.
- 8. Immediately notify the Long Island Bulldog Rescue if this dog is lost.
- 9. Permit a Long Island Bulldog Rescue member to observe the premises where the dog is housed and to reclaim the dog if, in the sole judgment of the Long Island Bulldog Rescue member, it is not being cared for as agreed to in this document, or if the Long Island Bulldog Rescue is required to return the dog to a third party, or if facts have been misrepresented to the Long Island Bulldog Rescue

Not everyone is able to make the commitment to invest time, attention, and love into a Bulldog to let someone else ultimately have the thrill of its companionship. Yet it is only through fostering that we are able to help multiple Bulldogs instead of the one or two that each of us could help every few years if we kept them instead of placing them. So, if you are looking to adopt, you may not be well-suited to becoming a foster caretaker. This doesn't mean that you would never be allowed to adopt a Bulldog that you fostered. But that should not be your primary motivation in taking on this job.

- 3. All pages, forms, information, designs, documents, printed matter, policies and procedures, conversations, messages (received or transmitted), resources, contacts, e-mail lists, e-mail messages, client, staff or public information are confidential and the sole property of LIBR. This also includes, but is not limited to, any information of, or relating to, our staff, clients, operations and activities. This privilege extends to all forms and formats in which the information is maintained and stored, including, but not limited to hardcopy, photocopy, microform, automated and/or electronic form.
- 4. Defining 'client' as dog, other animal or human being: Client information, including all written, spoken, observed, electronic or any other form of information is not be disclosed to any third party, under any circumstances, without the specific consent of the LIBR Executive Director or her designee.
- 5. Information regarding any other LIBR volunteer or employee, including all written, spoken, observed, electronic or any other form of information is not to be disclosed to any third party, under any circumstances, without the specific consent of the LIBR Executive Director or her designee.
- 6. Any intentional or unintentional disclosure, misuse, copying or transmitting of any material, data or information via any means, including but not limited to using personal, business, LIBR, and/or third party or other in-person, phone, email, mail, Facebook, Twitter or any other means of communication will subject me to disciplinary action and/or prosecution, according to the procedures set by LIBR and any applicable laws.

Thank you for becoming a foster parent/family! Fostering is one of the most important parts of rescue and rehoming. Dogs in foster homes do so much better than dogs in shelters. We are grateful to our foster families. Here are some things to be aware of as you start your journey with your new foster dog.

- Your foster dog has just suffered some profound losses. Whatever his home or family were like, they were his home and family. They are gone forever, he is confused. He may pace, drink tons of water, pee on your couch, not eat, eat like it was his last meal, hump everyone, and generally alarm you.
- Whatever you may expect, it's almost a guarantee that the dog will surprise you. Ask your coordinator what to do if you don't understand something. You are not bothering us, that is what we are here for.
- For the first 2 weeks, the dog should only meet the people he lives with, and the
 vet. We know it's fun to introduce the dog to friends and family, but he will be
 overstimulated. He should go for leash walks (no flexi leashes) with a martingale
 collar. Unless the dog came with a harness, do not use one. It's a new feeling,
 and he has lots of new feelings now that he may have trouble handling. LIBR
 dogs do not go to dog parks, or groomers.
- During this period, let him come to you. Do not overwhelm him with affection.
 Children should be friendly but not hug or crowd the dog. Other animals should meet at a neutral place outside, and go for walks together, but do not just let the new dog loose with the others.

If you have a question or issue, call your Coordinator. Do not call your transport person or the person who did your home visit. If it is an emergency, such as trouble breathing, nonstop vomiting, bleeding, or non stop diarrhea, *DO NOT TEXT, FB MESSAGE OR E MAIL*. CALL US ANY TIME.
